
Club Meeting at Tierrasanta Library November 28th





Metal Detecting Made Easy by Dwight Reed

Finding great treasures using a metal detector involves more than just a trip to the local park. Trying to find old places where people gathered for various reasons or events is a time consuming job. You may find old timers sitting around parks, stores, or restaurants that can answer questions about old houses or gathering places in your local area.

Many people who metal detect do not share their information about their favorite sites, at least not until they're sure they've plucked every piece of metal from the ground and have moved on to more promising territory. Therefore, it is up to you to locate your own potential promising locations. I like to look for parks that are 10 years old or older (30 year is better) off the beating path. Parks that have features that attract visitors should be noted while searching. Many time these places have hidden treasures.

I may get lucky and find an occasional wheat cent or silver Rosevelt dime after digging a few hundred pull tabs and nails. Don't get discouraged because your finding pull tabs and nails. Good finds often hide with all the trash. Another good place to search is around and in old swimming holes. Best time to detect these areas is the late afternoon when the crowds go home and there are less people to contend with.

Beach detecting, especially during the summer months, can turn up some nice targets. People like to flaunt their wealth in public with their rings and necklaces. Someone will always lose their ring, necklace, coins, sunglasses, or cell phone.

Searching old homes in the neighborhood is another potential. Always ask permission from the land owner before hunting. Once I've received permission, my heart starts to race. This place may have never been detected before. There should be minimal trash in the yard because most home owners don't usually throw trash in their own yards. The real attraction is a silver coin in the yard. Depending on the age of the house, there may be an Indian Head or wheat cent or two and other coins. If you're real lucky, you may find a gold coin or ring.

Other good spots are fishing/camping sites, fairgrounds, and ballfields. Old maps can help located often forgotten places. For best results, learn how your detector works!

Monthly Find Competition Rules Entering Your Find

General info: We currently have 8 categories. Your find should fit into one of them!

Every find must have been made with a metal detector since the last meeting.

(Note: If your find is sent to you from another country [i.e. England] you may enter it in the month you received it) You may enter only one item in each category. items that are found together count as one item. (A cross on a chain, matching bracelets, are examples.) The competition table judges will help you place your find if needed. Their decisions are final! . Categories:

Most Unusual. Our catchall category! If your item fits better elsewhere it should be placed there. Tell us what you know about your find. Age, type of metal, what makes it unusual! Examples: a brass boat rudder, a meteorite, a toy, who knows!

Relic. Must be at least 50 years old! Describe the item.

Best Foreign Coin or Token. What is it? Is it dated? Does it have value? Type of metal? An undated gold Roman coin can go here!

Oldest Dated Coin. The date must be visible with a loop. We have to be able to read the date!

Best North American Coin. Canada, USA, and Mexican coins. An identifiable "slick" large cent might win this category.

Best Other Jewelry. Non-precious metal items that were made as personal adornment items or for display purposes.

Silver. Items stamped .800 and above or sterling. You can also have an item tested and certified. <u>Silver plated</u> items belong in Other Jewelry.

Gold, Platinum and Palladium. Items stamped with a claim as to the metal content, or tested and certified. Counterfeit items will be removed by the judges. <u>Gold plated non-precious metal</u> items belong in the Other Jewelry category.

Best overall. What was your favorite item from all of the other categories? It may be the most valuable find, or it may not! Examples: The gold ring with diamonds, the Civil War sword

<u>VOTING.</u> Vote for one item in each category by circling the letter on the voting slip that corresponds with that item's envelope. **Vote once for your personal choice as to the best overall find from among the 8 preceding categories.**






